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Details for the Agenda of the F.N.I.F. COMMITTEE on
October 14th, as arranged with Miss Baggallay
on October 2nd.

A. Appointment of M.O.H. for lectures on Public Health
Administration.

Dr. Mess will move this, having got all the details from Miss Baggallay. Reference to May Minutes. The change in plan from what was decided in May is due to the fact that there are more Public Health students than was anticipated.

Under this heading Dr. Mess will also report on the allocation of lectures between Col. Parkinson and the M.O.H. To recommend 38 lectures by Col. Parkinson and 8 by the M.O.H.

B. To admit 6 new applicants.

One from New Zealand (Bridges) very doubtful.

C. Prospectus.

First discussion of possible changes in the curriculum for 1936-37.

(Discussed with Miss Baggallay at some length the desirability of not printing the Prospectus for the coming session earlier than April or May in the present session. Pointed out that the present system of printing the new Prospectus a year before it is used is unsatisfactory, because so much of the details incorporated must be inaccurate. Pointed out that it was better to circulate the current Prospectus as a guide to what might be expected, saying that the new Prospectus would follow in May. If these rearrangements were made, it would be possible to print the F.N.I.F. Prospectus with the same information as has to be included in the new College Prospectus. This proposal does not entail more printing of the Prospectus, as it already has to be done twice a year. Miss Baggallay agreed to consider favourably the above suggestion and to have a reprint of the Prospectus for 1935-36 for present circulation (with Mrs. Reid's name omitted and Dr. Mess's inserted).

D. Tutors' Reports.

Miss Baggallay's report will contain three sections:

(a) Suggestions for revision of the curriculum in practical work.
(Before Mrs. Reid went, she and Miss Baggallay invited a number

of the senior students to discuss with them what they considered might be advantageous alterations in the curriculum. They report that they had many useful suggestions. Miss Baggallay proposes to bring forward at the meeting those which affect the practical work. Those which affect the lectures we agreed should come up in the usual course of new suggestions for 1936-7 through Dr. Mess).

(b) Routine report on the students' work.

(c) Report of trip round the Scandinavian countries, which she has made with Dean Goodrich, from the middle of July to the end of August. (The Rockefeller Foundation financed her). She considers that the trip brought her very valuable experience and information, and was also excellent propaganda, as they were able to meet in all the big Scandinavian towns the nucleus of all the F.N.I.F. Committees.
