Report of an Informal Meeting concerning  
Courses for International Students.

An informal meeting was held on February 2nd 1934 at 2 p.m.

An informal meeting was held to discuss the possibility of devising a one year Social Studies course suitable for trained nurses who also had qualified for Public Health recognition in their own country. Proposals drawn up by Mrs. Reid were before the Committee who proceeded to plan a course utilising existing courses of lectures in the Social Studies Department which it was hoped might be accepted for the following purposes:-

As a one year's course in Social Studies which would be accepted by the Florence Nightingale Foundation for the International certificate alternatively with the Nurse Administrators and the Public Health Courses,

and

which would serve also as a basis for further training for hospital almoning or some other course in specialised work.

It was suggested that the Foundation certificate should be awarded at the end of the year's course in Social Studies and that the further specialised training, if any, which followed it should be recognised by the body training the student, either by means of a further certificate or by means of a statement to show that they had undergone the specialised training.

Mrs. Reid expressed the hope that it might be possible to establish this course for the session 1934-35 since she had understood from Mrs. Carter that if it was available there would in all probability be candidates for admission for next year. Mrs. Reid expressed the wish that the course should be established if possible before she retired.

(If this goes satisfactorily on February 16th to suggest that the Organisation Committee be called before the end of term so that a Social Studies course may be included in 1934-5 programme.)
