Mrs. Reid put before the Committee the following outline for the Syllabus of lectures and discussions for the Summer School, pointing out that it was proposed to divide the work under the following headings:-

  - c. I special course in connection with Public Health.
- B. Discussion Classes in connection with lectures.
- C. Demonstrations in connection with the Special Courses.
- D. A few evening lectures for all students.
- A. Courses of Lectures.
  - a. General lectures for all students. 3 courses.
    - i. "The Principles of Education! Lecturer Miss Melhuish 5 lectures.

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- ii. "Psychology of Moral Life" Lecturer Professor Edgell. 5 lectures.
- iii. "Mental Hygiene" Lecturer (not decided)
  4 lectures
- b. Special lectures for Nurse Administrators 1 course of 8 lectures.

Considerable discussion took place in connection with the lecturers proposed and the expense of bringing them to England for the Summer School, the date of the first lecture, etc.

Recommended

that the outline for the Syllabus of lectures and discussions suggested be approved in general.

that Mrs. Carter be asked whether the League of Red Cross Societies would be prepared to defray the travelling expenses of lecturers such as Miss Jean Brown and Miss Johns.

that the League of Red Cross be asked whether they know of any suitable lecturers who would be in Europe at the time of the course.

that a statement of the lecturers' fees, drawn up in accordance with information received from Mrs. Carter, be before the Finance Committee at their next meeting.
