Degree in Nursing Studies

The B.Sc. degree with Nursing Studies as the main field of study is offered by Bedford College, in association with the Macdonald-Buchanan School of Nursing of the Middlesex Hospital, according to University of London Regulations for First Degrees based on Course-Units.

I Regulations

- 1. To obtain the degree, a student must have completed a prescribed amount of work in not less than four years. Part of each year will be spent on clinical placements and in associated practical work.
 Successful candidates for the degree will also be awarded the professional qualification of State Registered Nurse.
 - 2. The work for the degree is divided into Courses, each of which is assessed and examined separately, either during or at some time after the conclusion of the Course. Each Course has a prescribed unit value and to qualify for the degree, a candidate must complete a minimum of 12 Course-Units and satisfy the examiners in at least 11. A minimum of 6 Course-Units must be in Nursing and the remainder in Social Policy. Students obtaining a standard above that required for a pass will be awarded Honours classified as First Class, Second Class (Upper Division), Second Class (Lower Division) and Third Class.
- 3. In accordance with University Regulations, a student may be refused entry to the examination in a Course if, in the view of the teachers of that Course, the student's attendance has been inadequate. In such a case the student will not be considered to have completed the Course.
- 4. Examinations will always contain some written element. This will usually take the form of written papers but may be in the form of a report or a practical examination. Oral examinations and assessment of practical placements and general performance throughout the Course may also be taken into consideration.

5. At the end of the first or second year a student may choose, or may be required, to proceed to a course of study leading to the award of a B.So. in another main field and without the professional nursing qualification. Such students will be eligible for the award of a B.Sc. degree after a minimum course of study of three years and on completion of at least 9 Course-Units with passes in 8.



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PROPOSAL - DEGREE IN NURSING STUDIES AND SOCIAL POLICY

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To provide for both an honours degree in Social Policy and a professional nursing qualification within the compass of a four-year degree.

- 1. The principles upon which this proposal is based are as follows:-
 - (a) The bulk of the professional teaching should be carried out in full-time blocks of eight weeks.
 - (b) The medical sciences should be taught both as a foundation course and as part of the professional teaching with which they should be integrated.
 - (c) The students should receive the bulk of their academic teaching on courses taken in common with other university students.
 - (d) The academic programme should constitute an integrated degree in the social sciences studied at honours level.
 - (e) The professional programme should constitute a complete professional training at a high professional standard.
 - (f) The students would be given an opportunity to relate their academic teaching to the professional training and to use their professional experience in the later courses of their academic programme, but this was not intended to be an integrated degree in which each element was specially designed to fit into a single integrated curriculum.

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- 2. The following administrative factors influenced the planning of the proposal:
 - (a) The Degree must be completed in four years.
 - (b) It must be based on course-units and be governed by the University regulations relating to such degrees.
 - (c) The academic teaching must take place in the ordinary University terms.
 - (d) The students would require the usual opportunities for vacation reading and revision.
 - (e) Examinations (but not the assessment of course work and practical work) must take place in early June of each year.
- 3. Of course, some of the principles in paragraph 1 are in conflict with one another as well as with the administrative constraints set out in paragraph 2. The proposal incorporates the following features designed to resolve these difficulties.
 - for professional training. Ideally, students should be free to use the long vacation for reading outside their course and for such experiences as foreign travel. In practice however, students are obliged to undertake paid employment as a means of subsisting over a period for which they have no grant and certainly if they are to attempt anything like foreign travel. We therefore propose to use the long vacation, except for a minimum of four weeks continuous break and for short breaks between courses where necessary, for professional training.

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- (b) The second University session (including the Xmas and Easter breaks) should be entirely devoted to academic work, allowing the students to be fully integrated with other second year students and to attain a high level of academic performance through full time study. Of course this means that students will not be involved directly in professional training for nine months, and we accept this.
- (c) The first University session should include a professional training component consisting of one-day week hospital experience and half-day a week professional teaching designed to back up that experience. The academic programme must be curtailed to allow this, but not in proportion, since we intend as now to recruit only able students with a genuine vocation and we can expect from such students above the average effort.
- (c) As the first and second years' work is designed principally to meet the requirements of the academic programme, so the structure of the third and fourth years' programme is designed mainly to meet the requirements of the professional training, and particularly the need for full-time teaching blocks. In both years, the long vacation block is followed by two winter blocks which occupy the period from mid September to mid January. Academic work is thus confined to the second half of the session, i.e. in the jargon of a course unit degree, the courses in these years will be "semester-based". In the third session the students will take only one academic course so that 50% of their time in the second half of the session (or semester) will be given to professional training.

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Special attention has been given to selecting a professional course where the experience need not be full-time and which will relate to the academic course which the students will be studying at the same time. In the fourth year both courses in the second semester will be academic but one will consist of an Extended Essay which will incorporate the student's professional as well as his or her academic study and will be supervised principally by the senior professional teacher. It is here, and in the course on the Sociology of Medicine which the students will take at the same time, that there will be a real opportunity for the students to integrate their professional with their academic study.

(e) It is recognised that the degree course is a demanding one and we consider that this is as it should be in a degree which incorporates both an scademic education to honours degree level and a professional training each of which on its own would ordinarily take a student three years. We propose to do this by accepting only good applications, by requiring them to work at an above average level of effort, and by using professional experience in the academic programme of the third and fourth years in substitution for academic courses that ordinary students would take in their third year, so that the students are able to reach honours level on the basis of a reduced academic programme. Even so, we recognise that some students may not be able, perhaps because of illness or other personal difficulties to reach the high professional and academic standards we demand in four years. For such students, we would make arrangements to extend the professional training

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into the first term of the fifth year and to make the award of State Registration dependent upon carrying out that extended training (which would usually comprise a block or a part of a block missed during the four years) and passing the assessment associated with it. We would also retime the academic programme to allow a student to take a fifth year and of course a student is always able to retake failed exams the following year without repeating the course. We would emphasise that we are thinking only of the odd student and he or she not every year and that we are not thinking of the student who simply fails and deserves to fail, who would have to repeat at least the whole of one session's work or withdraw altogether.

- 4. The assessment of the Professional Units has to be accommodated within University Regulations that are only just being developed to deal with Nursing Studies Degrees and the precise administrative structure set out below may need to be modified. Whatever was done in that respect however would not affect the arrangement of the curriculum. This curriculum has three elements:
 - A units that provide the student with elements of an education in the social sciences;
 - B units that provide the student with elements of a professional training;
 - C units that provide the student with elements of academic learning that applies the social sciences to areas of knowledge directly relevant to professional nursing.

Only B and C units will be regarded as recognised units in Nursing Studies. B units will include both theoretical teaching and practical experience; A and C units will be based entirely on academic learning.

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The Degree will comprise 16 units as follows:-

A - 6; B - $6\frac{1}{4}$; C - $3\frac{3}{4}$

so that the proportion of Nursing Studies to the whole is some 60 - 65%. Any further changes in the scheme will not change the overall balance.

By the end of the medical allocation the learner will be able to:-

OBJECTIVES: -

By the end of the surgical allocation the learner will be able to:-

- (i) Demonstrate the admission procedure for:-
 - (a) Patients for emergency surgery.
 - (b) Patients for elective surgery.
- (ii) Care for the patient in the pre-operative phase.
- (iii) Care for an unconscious patient.
- (iv) Care for the patient following surgery and during this post-operative phase, give reasoned care in order to prevent complications.

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GERIATRIC ALLOCATION

- (2) Visits with the geriatric health visitor / social worker.
- (3) Visit to the Day Hospital.
- (4) Participation in case conferences with the multidisciplinary team.

By the end of the allocation the learner will be able to:-

- (i) Identify the social, psychological and physical needs of his / her patients by taking a nursing history.
- (ii) Assist in planning the appropriate care for his / her patients by attendance at ward team case conferences.
- (iii) Plan and assist in all therapeutic measures relating to the above.
- (iv) Review the care of a patient by presenting a care study.

The study days will attempt to correlate theory and practice.

THIRD YEAR

8 week allocation - 320hours
Theory - 64 hours
Practice - 256 hours
ACUTE MEDICAL NURSING ALLOCATION.

AIMS:-

- (i) To enable the learner to comprehend the disease process in common medical conditions in relation to the total multi-disciplinary care the patient requires.
- (ii) To continue to develop in the learner her / his powers of observation and communication in order that accurate observations and measurements are made and recorded.
- (iii) To continue to develop in the learner the skills and, understanding necessary for giving comfort to the patient and administering appropriate therapy.

OBJECTIVES:-

By the end of the allocation the learner will be able to:-

- (i) Recognise common medical emergencies and begin to apply appropriate first aid measures.
- (ii) Describe the common medical disorders and relate them to the patients' signs and symptoms.
- (iii) Make and record accurate general medical observations.
- (iv) Give both physical and psychological comfort to the patient.
- (v) Administer and / or assist in all therapeutic measures needed by the patient.
- (vi) Apply problem solving techniques to patient care.

Six week allocation to ACUTE SURGICAL EXPERIENCE - 240 hours

Theory - 48 hours

Practice - 192 hours.

AIMS: -

To enable the learner to recognise her dual function;

- (i) In supporting individual patients throughout their time in hospital.
- (ii) In practicing the surgical techniques required for a successful outcome for the patient.

OBJECTIVES: -

By the end of the allocation the learner will be able to:-

- (i) Review surgical principles learned in the foundation course.
- (ii) Recognise signs and symptoms of commun surgical emergencies.
- (iii) Recognise and assist in the treatment of shock, haemorrhage and fluid loss.
 - (iv) Assist in the management of:-
 - (a) Multiple injuries.
 - (b) Head injuries.
 - (c) Burns and scalds.
 - (d) Crush injury.
 - (e) Intestinal obstruction.
 - (f) Internal haemorrhage.
 - (v) To give general nursing care to the patient including:-
 - (a) Principles and methods of replacements of body fluids.
 - (b) Principles of nutrition for the surgical patient.
 - (c) Preparation of the patient for investigations.

OBJECTIVES: -

- (ii) To gain an understanding of the principles of asepsis.
- (iii) To learn about the care of patients during the anaesthetic phase and to realise the importance of adequate pre-enaesthetic preparation and care.

Experience in GYNAECOLOGICAL NURSING

 $2\frac{1}{2}$ days / week for 6 weeks = 120 hours

AIMS:-

(i) To introduce the learner to her dual role as woman and health educator by her understanding of the need for family planning and "well woman" clinics.

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(ii) To give the learner experience in nursing women with gynaecological disorders with special emphasis on "accurate empathy, non-possessive warmth and genuineness".

OBJECTIVES:-

By the end of the experience the learner will be able to:-

- (i) Describe the anatomy and physiology of the female reproductive system and fertilization.
- (ii) Apply a problem solving approach to the nursing care of women following:-
 - (a) Hysterectomy.
 - (b) Repaid of prolapse.
 - (c) Abortion therapeutic and spontaneous.
 - (d) Cancer.
 - (e) Investigations.

This links with counselling unit in the academic course which runs concurrently.

OPTIONS

A. 8 weeks allocation to OBSTETRICS - 320 hours.

AIMS:-

To introduce the learner to the theory and practice of midwifery in order to:-

- (i) Gain sufficient knowledge to give support to pregnant women and guidance regarding the advice they should seek.
- (ii) Encourage interest in future professional training.

(iii) Act as a self-preparation for parenthood.

OBJECTIVES: -

By the end of the allocation the learner will be able to:-

- (1) Assist the midwife or doctor with antenatal care.
- (ii) Assist the midwife or doctor conducting labour.
- (iii) Give post-natal care.
 - (iv) Teach and help the mothers to care for their newborn babies.
 - (v) Assist with babies needing special care under the supervision of the midwife and mandiatrician.
 - (vi) Understand the continuing care of mother and baby following discharge from hospital.
- B. 8 weeks allocation to PAEDIATRICS 320 hours.

(N.B. Student will have completed the academic unit in Psychology)

AIMS: -

To develop an understanding of child care in health and sickness.

OBJECTIVES: -

At the end of the allocation the learner will have gained knowledge of:-

- (i) Normal development of the child.
- (ii) (a) Common medical and surgical disorders in childhood.
 - (b) Total nursing care of the nick beby, toddler and child.

- (iii) Effective communication skills.
 - (iv) The causes and management of physical and mentally handicapped. Psychological / social deprivation and their effects on the child and the family.
 - (v) The organization of the paediatric services within the District.
 - (vi) Teaching skills in order to communicate the principles and practice of child care.
- C. 8 week allocation to PSYCHIATRY 320 hours.

AIM:-

To introduce the learner to the importance of effective care and understanding in the treatment of the mentally ill and encourage the development of basic nursing skills in such treatment.

OBJECTIVES: -

Clinical At the end of the allocation the learner will have begun to develop basic social and practical skills in treating the

mentally ill.

Communication At the end of the allocation the learner will appreciate the importance of effective communication between staff / staff and staff / patients and will have learned to apply scientific methods in observing, reporting and participating in clinical meetings.

D. 8 weeks allocation to GERIATRICS - 320 hours.

AIM:-

To enable the student to participate actively in the multi-disciplinary care of the elderly patient both in hospital and in the community.

OBJECTIVES :-

By the end of the allocation, the student will be able to:-

- (i) Assess the needs of the patients and plan the care required. (Take a nursing history.)
- (ii) Carry out the nursing skills necessary for such care.
- (iii) Evaluate the total care given with reference to the physical, psychological and social problems existing. (Problem solving approach.)

Link with medical sociology unit in the academic course.

E. Consolidation Block

4 weeks allocation - 160 hours.

AIM:- L

To enable the student to act as a senior nurse on a ward and develop her managerial skills.

be presented thus:

First, a nursing history will be taken and needs and problem areas isolated.

Second, a nursing care plan will be formulated and initiated.

Third, following the implementation of the care plan, the whole situation will be evaluated and any necessary modification made.

In preparing for this assessment, the learner will employ a problem solving approach.

- e) November/December 3rd Year Acute Surgical Nursing as for (d) above.
- f) 2nd Semester 3rd Year Gynaecological Nursing. The learner will be presented with a "work book" which will need to be completed during the allocation, and will require in its completion an application of theory and and understanding of the principles underlying the nursing of gynaecological patients.
- g) 3rd Long Vacation Obstetric Nursing
- h) September October 4th Year Paediatric Nursing
 Both (g) and (h) will be evaluated by a multiple choice questionnaire.
- i) November/January 4th Year Psychiatric Nursing
- j) Vacation 4th Year Geriatric Nursing In both (i) and (j) the learner will be expected to employ the specific contents of the course in the presentation of cases to a multi-disciplinary audience. Assessment of this case presentation will be made by the relevant course tutors.

A SYSTEM OF PROFESSIONAL ASSESSMENT

It is envisaged that the learners will be assessed continuously during the whole length of the course, as follows:

- Every aspect of work in the wards will be assessed by trained staff and will take the form of ward reports.
 In addition, monitoring of progress in practical and managerial skills will be carried out by tutorial staff at frequent intervals.
- 2. Continued assessment of the learner will follow thus:
 - At the end of the first year, to evaluate the Foundation Course a two hour essay-type paper will be answered by the learners. This paper will contain questions to test the learner's progress in basic nursing skills. It will be aimed at evaluating the learner's ability to translate theory into practice when applied to medical, surgical and geriatric areas, and to assess the learner's usefulness as a member of the ward team.
 - b) Following the introduction to the Foundation Sciences the learner will be assessed in each subject. The form this paper takes will depend on the individual tutors, but the assessment will be a written one.

Papers will be set in: Anatomy & Physiology
Pathology
Microbiology
Psychology

This session will take place in the 1st long vacation.

- c) The nursing practice on long-stay wards will be evaluated by the presentation of a care study. As this experience follows the completely academic second year of the course, the care study will be a piece of written work looking at one patient's total care. The academic content of the first 2 years of the course will enable the learner to view the patient with greater insight using the tools given him/her during lectures in sociology and administration of health services. This takes place in the second long vacation (2nd year)
- d) September/October 3 rd Year Acute Medical Nursing
 - (i) Multiple Choice questionnaire
 - (ii) An assessment of the learner in the ward.

 This will evaluate the care given to one patient and will
