Dear Principal,

I am writing on behalf of the Secretary General to confirm the statement he made in his speech on July 7th, that the League would organize a Summer School for past students of the International Courses next July from the 17th to 29th. This, of course, is subject to the approval of the Board of Governors which meets in October but, as it will be strongly recommended by the Secretary General, there is no reason to suppose that the Board will not approve it. The dates have been fixed on account of the International Council of Nurses which is holding its congress in Paris and Brussels from the 9th to 15th. It is very probable that a large number of our students will attend this congress.

We propose that the Organization Committee at Bedford College be responsible for the educational part, if you will kindly consent to this. I suggest that the same plan be followed as in 1928, namely, that a small sub-committee, composed of members of Bedford College and the College of Nursing, be asked to draw up a syllabus. If this committee could present a tentative syllabus at the meeting of the Organization Committee next October it would save delay, otherwise we shall have to wait until the January meeting which will be rather late for us to circularize our students.

Miss MacManus, Chairman of the Education Committee of the College of Nursing, wrote to the League a few weeks ago asking if, in the event of the College of Nursing holding its 'Study Week' at the same time, the League would collaborate. We should be very glad to collaborate with the College of Nursing in any way that the Organization Committee thinks practical.

We should very much appreciate it if we could have the rooms in residence for our students as in 1928. There is no question that the opportunities the students had to be in residence in College contributed very largely to the success of the Summer School.

It is rather difficult to say at this stage what the numbers will be but we are sending out post-cards to the students asking them to let us know, so we hope to have some idea as to the numbers in time. We are hoping to have at least from 100 to 130.

I am leaving on Saturday, and shall be back in October in time to be in London, I trust, for the Organization Committee WHEn we shall be able to talk the whole matter over more fully.
