Thank you for your letter of December 7th with regard to Miss Banwarth and Miss Hofman-Bang. I am sending it over to Miss Monkhouse to bring before the next meeting of the Bedford College Committee.

I do not think it would serve any purpose if I were to discuss the matter with the two students, though they are of course at liberty to see me if they wish to do so. It would perhaps be more helpful if you and I discussed the matter.

The point on which I feel doubt is this: I do not think we should recommend any courses outside the College except where we cannot cover the needs of the students within the College.

With regard to Dr. Hutchinson's course, C.9. in the green book, I see that this is headed Psychiatry, not Child Psychiatry. If, in point of fact it is only Child Psychiatry, it seems to me that there should be a correction in the green book. If not, does it not cover the requirements of these students, or could it not be adapted to do so?

Is there sufficient demand for Child Psychiatry to justify a specialised course being given in it? I should like to point out that we have strong Departments of Psychology and of Physiology and in addition that we have a medical woman, Dr. Hutchinson, and several medical men giving courses. Is it not possible that with collaboration and with some adjustment we could supply the needs of students within the College?

I raise these points in a letter so that you may have the opportunity of turning them over in your mind before seeing me.
