Dear Miss Dorsey,

Herewith please find the application of Miss Lulu Wolf for admission to the 1936-37 Florence Nightingale International Foundation courses. Miss Wolf has been awarded the scholarship of \$1,000 offered by the American Nurses' Association committee and is therefore recommended to you. She is prepared to meet the additional expense of the course from other sources.

You will note that Miss Wolf is especially interested in nursing practice. She is eagerly looking forward to the opportunity for observing and studying the English methods of which she has heard (who has not!) most favorably.

Miss Wolf will take the regular course if it is required of her. Miss Baggallay's letter of March 5th seems to indicate that this may not be absolutely essential. It seems very probable that Miss Wolf has already had the equivalent of the required course in hygiene. Should your committee find it possible to grant exemption, Miss Wolf asks if it may be possible for her to substitute a special study of comparative nursing methods or procedures. I am confident that this request will be received with lively interest. I hope very much that it may be arranged. Should it be impossible, however, since it would obviously require considerable time on the part of a faculty adviser, Miss Wolf authorises me to say that work in either Psychology or Sociology would be acceptable substitutes.

As you know, we have some hesitancy about asking for modifications of the course. On the other hand, we feel sure of your sympathetic understanding of our reluctance to have a nurse repeat work if she can show that she has satisfactorily covered it.
