INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS - HOSPITAL GROUPLent Term

Miss Vitkauskaitė has shown great interest in her work. Her outlook on matters connected with hospital administration and the education of student nurses has broadened considerably. She is observant and interested and appears alive to the possibility of adapting the methods she has studied here to the needs of her own country.

During the Easter vacation, arrangements were made for her to study the work undertaken in the Preliminary Training School, St. Thomas's Hospital. She also spent several days in the Hospital Social Service Department. From April 14th - 17th, Miss Vitkauskaitė obtained some insight into the work of the Matron's Office and Secretarial Department of the East Surrey Hospital, Redhill.

Miss Stencil has at last overcome the language difficulty and has made great progress this term. She is a steady worker and is always anxious to make the best possible use of her opportunities.

During the East vacation, Miss Stencil worked in the Hospital Social Service Department of St. Thomas's Hospital (April 3rd - 17th). At the East Surrey Hospital, Redhill (March 26th - 29th), she studied the work of the Matron's Office and Secretary's Office, and obtained experience with the Queen's Nurses.
