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#### Outline Curriculum for a Nursing Studies Degree

- 1. The central problem is how to provide for both an honours degree in Social Policy and a professional nursing qualification within the compass of a four-year degree. The answer must be to make use of the long-vacations. If a student may be required to complete four course-units in an academic year of c.24 teaching weeks, he could be expected to undertake the equivalent of one course-unit in a six-week long vacation course. If one such course is taken each long vacation (including the long-vacation following the final exams), then altogether the student would study the equivalent of twenty course-units in a four-year degree. This would allow ten units each for nursing studies and for social policy and it would seem feasible to provide for a professional course and an honours degree in this framework.
- 2. At present, students reading for Social Policy take twelve units and the existing programme would have to be streamlined, both to reduce it to ten units and to incorporate within it a better provision for Psychology. It might be possible to reshape part of the present first year and/or provide for part of the Psychology within the Nursing Studies units. The essential part of an honours degree in Social Policy lies in there being a full and integrated second-year programme and it does not seem possible to modify this requirement. The first year programme on the other hand could permit some concurrent Nursing Studies and the third year programme would easily be spread over two years and undertaken alongside a substantial Nursing Studies commitment.
- 3. The professional studies programme must not only extend to between 75 and 80 weeks training but must allow a maximum number of full-time teaching blocks, ideally of eight weeks in length. The problem, therefore, arises of how to accommodate these blocks outside the long vacation when the students are also undertaking academic study. The answer would seem to be to have the academic units in the third and fourth years semesterbased and taking place only in the second semester of the session. This would leave a period available for full-time professional study up to about the middle of January in the third and fourth years.

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4. One of the fixed time-tabling factors is constituted by the examinations which must take place in the last half of June. In addition, during the first and second years, the students would have to have the full Christmas and Easter vacations available to other students in both of which work is expected from them. Taking all these factors into account, the outline curriculum might look something as follows.
