Dear Miss Bowes,

I cannot give you a definite answer to your letter about the lectures in Social Administration until after the next meeting of the Council, which will be held on July 9th. I have, however, talked over the matter with Mrs Reid and have ascertained that, if the Council approve, there would be no difficulty with regard to arranging for the lectures to be given in the Lent Term.

I do not think it is likely that the Council will agree to the suggestion with regard to fees made in the third paragraph of your letter. It is our invariable practice for all lectures given here to charge on the basis of fees for each individual student and it will set a precedent which might lead to difficulties in other cases if we vary this arrangement in the case of students from the College of Nursing. I understand from Mrs Reid that you expect about 40 students will be attending the courses. It is possible that, for so large a number, the Council might be prepared to allow some reduction in the present fee of 2 guineas per student but I think it is most improbable that they would admit them for less than the fee charged to students from other Colleges of the University on the intercollegiate system. This fee is £1. 9. 6 per term.

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I am very glad that the lectures given in the present term have been enjoyed by the students.
