Dear Sir,

Your letter of the 9th January to the Principal was before the Council of Bedford College at their meeting on Thursday last. The Council were much gratified to learn that the League's appeal for scholarships to continue the course for the interim period 1933-34 had been successful. They appreciate that some revision of expenditure and a cutting down of expenses may be necessary in view of the special circumstances of this interim period and they are prepared to do what they can to assist the League of Red Cross Societies in this matter.

I am therefore authorised to say that for the year 1933-34 my Council will be willing to accept the students for a fee of £50 per head per student to cover all tuition fees, including practical work, the League paying in addition the salaries of the two Tutors at Bedford College specially appointed in connection with their practical work and involving expenditure of £512.10.0.

The Council understand that the League are making no provision in their budget for payment for six lectures on "Public Speaking" as hitherto and they are prepared to include these lectures in the fee of £50.

It has always been a source of gratification to Bedford College to be associated with the League of Red Cross Societies in this work of training foreign students and they are only too glad to co-operate in the splendid effort made by the Red Cross and the Nurses which has made it possible to carry on the courses for this interim period.
