Dear Miss Monkhouse,

I have returned to the office and found your letter of December 21st, to which I hasten to reply.

With regard to question

(a) I am doubtful if we will be able to secure Miss Johns after all. However, there is still some hope as Mr. Pearce of the Rockefeller Foundation arrives from the States to-morrow, when Miss Crowell will discuss the mattef with him. I shall know definitely in a few days. I do not think there will be any difficulty in securing Miss Bridge or Miss Hodgman, should they be willing to undertake it. In the instance of Miss Bridge or Miss Johns the League would certainly be prepared to defray the travelling expenses and offer hospitality. In the event of our not being able to secure either of these, I feel sure that if the Committee strongly recommended it, the League would consider bringing Miss Hodgman from the States, but I have not yet discussed this with the Secretary General. I will probably be able to give you a more definite answer when I come over on January 12th.

(b) I think that we will have to be prepared to pay the usual fees, but I feel sure in certain cases this will not be expected. If the Canadian Red Cross send Miss Jean Browne, which we are asking them to do as she is Red Cross and also an old student, I feel sure that a fee will not be expected, and should the Rockefeller Foundation permit Miss Johns to come, they will almost certainly do it at their own expense. In the instance Miss Monkhouse

of Miss Bridge we should probably have to offer a fee, but I should like to talk this over with you when I come to London.

I do not think the leaders of the discussions would expect fees. We would certainly be responsible for all travelling expenses and hospitality.

(d) Miss Johns, Field Director of Nursing, Rockefeller Foundation.

I hope to let you know in a few days if it is worth while approaching her officially.

With regard to Miss Jean Browne Colonel Draudt has already written to the Canadian Red Cross asking them if they will send her to England in July. In the event of their granting this request, I gather that an official invitation would go direct to Miss Jean Browne from the Council of Bedford College.

With reference to the minutes of the Sub-Committee which you so kindly enclosed, on page 2, clause 6, would you make a small correction. Miss Jean Browne is on the staff of the Canadian Red Cross and not working for the League, as stated in the minutes. Miss Monkhouse
