Dear Mrs Ferguson,

I have marked the four intermediate examination papers in Pathology and Therapeutics held during the BSc in Nursing Studies SRN Course at Bedford College.

Regarding these papers, one person passed with 51% and the other three students achieved 49%. As I was worried about my marking, I showed the papers to one of our tutors in the combined SRN/DN Course. She said that I had been too generous. Even Miss Milne's paper (51%) was patchy. Apart from this paper, the others demonstrated a lack of depth of knowledge of both Pathology and Pharmacology. I feel that the three candidates who obtained 49%, had written answers which were less than BSc standard.

I believe that more in-depth knowledge of both Pathology and Pharmacology is required. From all that I can see of the papers, I felt that there was a general lack of detailed knowledge of these subjects.
