Dear Miss Monkhouse,

Would the Council of Bedford College agree to allow the £50 fee paid by our International students to cover the membership fee for the Students' Union (16/-) which is now compulsory for all students and also the registration fee of 10/6d for all students registering with the University as Associate Students?

I realise that in making this request I am asking for a reconsideration of the basis on which the fee is calculated, but as the basis of the original calculation has been very much altered by recent changes in the curriculum, I think that your Council might possibly consider this proposal.

Since 1936 the International students have been limited in their choice of lecture courses and are normally only allowed six subjects. This has meant a considerable reduction in the number of students attending courses outside Bedford College and a consequent reduction in cost.

The special lecture courses arranged by Bedford College for International students are now all attended by other students, and in the case of three of these courses, the intercollegiate fees paid by these students

must greatly reduce the cost of providing special lectures.

On the other hand I realise that we have asked the College in the case of one or two special students, to incur abnormal expenses. I am not suggesting in any way that we are not absolutely satisfied with the present financial arrangement. I am asking however that the two definite charges added this year to our educational expenses: the membership of the Students' Union and the registration in the University be paid for our students out of their composite fee.
