The Committee were informed that the Norwegian Red Cross had intimated to Mrs. Carter that their President realised that Miss Lier's general education did not satisfy the formal requirements for admission to the course at Bedford College, yet he felt sure that Miss Lier, by good social education was in a position to profit by the course and that it would be of great value to her to be able to do so.

Mrs. Carter supported the application and after discussion it was RESOLVED that the above candidate be accepted.

# (ii) Alice Eden - Age 27 - Great Britain.

# (iii) Vassilka Mitowa - age 28 - Bulgaria.

Details given by the candidate in her application paper.

Education - Elementary - 4 years 1913-1917 3 " 1917-1920 Secondary - 4 " 1920-1924

Professional Training - Royal Infirmary, Manchester 1927-31 Present position - Sister in charge of Surgical Ward, Red Cross Hostital

Knowledge of English - fluent Recommended by the Bulgarian Red Cross.

Information was before the committee to the effect that this candidate after having been trained in England for three to four years still found the English language a great difficulty; that Miss Duff Grant, Matron of the Manchester Royal Infirmary had reported that she had passed the Manchester Royal Infirmary examination with great difficulty, that she had failed in the preliminary State Examination after three years in Hospital and that her knowledge of English was still so poor that she felt she would be quite unable to follow the course at Bedford College satisfactorily.

17th May 1932. Mrs. Carter explained that it was a difficult case as the Bulgarian Red Cross had so high an opinion of the English training that they would be difficult to persuade that anyone who had been trained in England for three to four years was not competent to follow the course. Discussion took place. that a recommendation be sent forward to the RESOLVED League of Red Cross Societies that this student be rejected on the grounds that she is not sufficiently proficient in the English language to make it possible for her to follow the course at Bedford College. The Committee were also informed that other applications were expected from the Polish Red Cross and Icelandic Ked Cross but that these had not yet been received. 5. Reports from Tutors in the Practical Work. a. Public Health Students. Miss Baggallay. Tutor to the students taking the Public Health course gave a satisfactory report on the opportunities which the students had had in the country during the Easter Vacation. (For report see . file 196C) Nurse Administrator Students. Miss Parsons, Tutor to the Nurse Administrator Students, also emphasised the advantage of sending students outside London for part of their practical work. (For report see file 1960) International Florence Nightingale Foundation. Memorandum containing the proposals for the International Florence Nightingale Foundation with the resolutions passed by the Executive Committee of the League of Red Cross Societies on April 25th. (Memorandum appended after Council Minutes for May 11th 1932, see folios....) The Principal spoke to the matter and stated that she, Mrs. Reid and the Secretary had represented Bedford College at certain preliminary meetings at the British Red Cross Society in connection with the

proposal that an International Florence Nightingale Memorial should be initiated. She pointed out to the committee that the memorandum referred to above, and which had been circulated to the committee, made no mention of the institution which should be responsible for conducting the educational work in connection with the Florence Nightingale Foundation; that the Council of Bedford College could only co-operate in the new scheme provided that they were again intrusted with the educational side of the work; that the Secretary General of the League had asked to know whether the Council of Bedford College and the College of Nursing were in agreement with the proposals; that the memorandum had been before the Council of Bedford College at their meeting in the previous week when the following resolution had been passed:-

"That the Council of Bedford College are in agreement with the proposals for the foundation of an International Memorial to Florence Nightingale and with the resolutions passed by the Executive Committee of the League of Red Cross Societies at its meeting held on April 25th 1932, provided that, should the plans for the International Florence Nightingale Memorial Foundation in London mature and it be desired that Bedford College take any part in the educational work, responsibility for the conduct of the courses be under the control of the Council of Bedford College in the same way as they at present control the courses for International Students under the League of Red Cross Societies."

Mrs. Carter explained that the memorandum had not been sent by the League direct to the College of Nursing as all communications with them had hitherto been done by the Council of Bedford College. It was agreed that the memorandum should now be sent forward to the College of Nursing.

Mrs. Carter emphasised the point that no details with regard to the educational work had yet been set out.

RESOLVED

that the Committee for the Organisation of Courses for International Students are in agreement with the resolution passed by the Council of Bedford College.

that the memorandum be sent to the College of Nursing asking them whether they agree to the proposals contained therein.

RESOLVED

that the date of the next meeting be fixed for Monday July 4th at 2.30 p.m.

#### 8. Other business.

### a. Demonstrations in Maternity and Child Welfare.

Mrs. Reid reported that in accordance with powers given to her she had arranged for six demonstrations at £3.3.0 each to be given to the International students at St. Thomas's Hospital during the session 1932-33 by Dr. A.D. Bell (Visiting Physician to the Childrens and Motherdraft Department, St. Thomas's Hospital) in place of the course of 10 lectures on Maternity and Child Welfare hitherto given by Dr. Chodak Gregory. (Proposed syllabus of lectures appended, see folio....)

RESOLVED

that Dr. A.D.C. Bell be invited to give six demonstrations on Maternity and bild Welfare to the International Students at St. Thomas's Hospital during the session 1932-33 at a fee of £3.3.0 per demonstration.

### b. Hospital Training School Administration - Miss Musson.

Miss Parsons emphasised the need to have one or two lectures from Municipal Hospital Matrons and proposed that Miss Musson should give 18 lectures of the course instead of 20 lectures and that two should be given by Matrons from Municipal Hospitals. She stated that she had talked the matter over with Miss Musson who was in agreement with her proposal.

RESOLVED

that the committee approve the re-arrangement proposed and leave details as regards final arrangements and personnel of such lectures in the hands of Miss Parsons in consultation with Miss Musson.

### c. Summer School in 1933.

Mrs. Carter informed the committee that it was hoped to arrange a two weeks summer school for International students to be held at Bedford College in 1933.
