Dear Dame Rachel,

The Council of Bedford College jointly with the League of Red Cross Societies are arranging a Summer School for those past students of the College known as the International Group, who have taken the Public Health Course or Nurse Administrators Course at Bedford College.

We are expecting students from all over the world and we have great hopes that the Summer School will mean much to them, both as a means of bringing their professional training up to date and as an opportunity of meeting and exchanging views with members of their profession in all parts of the world. It is the first of such summer schools and we are anxious to make it a great success:

One of the features of the Summer School is to be a few Evening Lectures bearing on International questions, given by persons of great distinction. Will you honour us by giving one of these lectures on the League of Nations on Wednesday evening, July 18th? It would be a real pleasure to welcome you at Bedford College and I hope very much we may be fortunate enough to gain your consent to this proposal. There will be about 60 to 70 students attending the Summer School, but the number at the lecture may be a little greater than this as there will be visitors from the College of Nursing and similar Institutions, as well as other foreigners of the same profession but not old students of the College.
