i. Final Arrangements for the Presentation of Certificates-26th June 1936.

ii. Wording of Statement to be given to Miss Dunbar at the end of her course.

RESOLVED

that the following statement be given to Miss Dunbar at the same time as the Florence Nightingale Certificates are given to the other students by H.R.H. The Duchess of Kent on June 26th 1936:

"This is to certify that Miss Virginia M. Dunbar has followed a special course arranged by Bedford College for Women (University of London) in conjunction with the College of Nursing during the academic year 1935-36. This course comprised the writing of a thesis on "The origin and early development of two early English Training Schools for Nurses" and the attendance at courses of lectures on Social Administration, Public Health Nursing and Social and Political Movements. She has done good work in these courses and her thesis has satisfied those who have directed her studies".

ii. Lulu Kathryn Wolf (U.S.A.)

Miss Baggallay read to the Committee a letter from the Secretary of the American Committee of the F.N.I.F. asking whether special arrangements could be made for Miss Wolfto substitute a special study of comparative nursing methods or procedures, but that failing this possibility they would be equally content if she studied either Psychology or Sociology. The Committee noted that Miss Wolf had exceptional qualifications. After discussion
