# Degree in Nursing Studies

The centre of gravity of the newly developed undergraduate course in nursing instituted at Bedford College in collaboration with the Middlesex Hospital, commencing in October 1981, will focus exclusively on academic and professional nursing studies. So as to develop expertise in both nursing practice and theoretical understanding about the nature of nursing, knowledge gained from selected areas in the field of social, behavioural and biological sciences will illuminate provisions particularly in the delivery of nursing care. Students will be able to explore ranges of nursing activities in both hospital and nonhospital, that is community settings, as they apply to clinical, administrative, teaching and research interests. While the course's main emphasis is on simultaneous integration between theory and practice, it follows the recently promulgated guidelines of the EEC directives for Nursing. Whereas the course provides opportunities for those interested in pursuing a nursing career both at home and overseas, its academic setting will encourage those so inclined to continue with further more advanced studies of their choice.

#### State Registration

The General Nursing Council has agreed to grant State Registration to graduates in Nursing.

#### Entrance Requirements

Candidates will be expected to have good overall qualifications at A/level, and to show an informed interest in the social sciences which need not necessarily be reflected in the candidate's choice of A/level subjects. Candidates must attain good qualifications in science at O or A level.

A typical candidate might include A/levels in Biology and in History, Geography or one of the social sciences and would have passed in Mathematics as well as in other science subjects at O/level, but any candidate who can expect to obtain good A/level results (grade C or better) and who can claim to be both literate and numerate will be considered seriously.

ALL APPLICATIONS MUST BE MADE THROUGH UCCA; there is no need to make a separate application to the Middlesex Hospital.
