Dear Mrs. Carter,

At the last meeting of the Committee for the Organisation of Courses for International Students the Committee received a report on the work of the Polish student Miss Zukowska. They were informed that she had great difficulty with the lectures owing not only to the language difficulty but to a general inability to understand the work. Miss Zukowska finds the non-professional side of the course very hard indeed to follow but she has done better in Hospital Administration a side of the work of which she has some experience and therefore feels more at home. The Committee were advised that Miss Zukowska was not making the best use of her time and would be better to withdraw from the course as a whole and concentrate on that part of the work she could do, namely the Hospital Administration side, thereby gaining as much advantage as possible, instead of attending a number of lectures which she cannot understand. On the other hand the Committee were unwilling to act arbitrarily in this case owing to the fact that Miss Zukowska had got a good mark for

Hospital Administration and might therefore with more practice possibly improve on the other side of the work. It was therefore decided that Miss Zukowske should be given the option of withdrawing from the course at once and making herself as proficient as possible on the Hospital Administration side, or of continuing with her present work for one more term on the chance of her showing sufficient improvement to complete the course successfully. We are, however, in giving Miss Zukowska this choice, giving her due warning that it is thought very improbable that her work will improve sufficiently to justify the award of the League of Red Cross certificate at the end of the year.

I am very anxious that you should know exactly what the position is in order that the League may be rightly informed on this matter in the event of Miss Zukowska choosing to continue with the course for another term and then not obtaining her certificate which in the opinion of those who know her work best is considered very probable.
